CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

Hello Greenwood Community,

Hope you are doing well and are just as in shock as what I am to be at over the halfway point to holidays – where is this term going?

I thought today I'd share a way to help you to teach your child/ren how to identify whether they have a big or small problem and a way to help them to work out whether they can solve the problem themselves. You can use the analogy of stones (stock, rocks, boulder) or my personal favourite — is it an ant or an elephant sized problem?

Ant sized problems – Are something small that they can work out the solution to themselves or with minimal support or intervention from an adult. Things such as spilling their drink, misplacing their lunchbox or minor teasing from a classmate that they should be able to ignore.

Elephant sized problems – Are problems that are much bigger and are usually those which require an adult to assist to work out a solution. These may include ongoing issues with friends that they cannot resolve themselves, situations that are outside of their control (fire, weather affecting their plans), physical altercations or situations that may make them feel unsafe.

Once children have worked out what size their problem is, they can then work to figure out what they can do to work towards solving them. You may need to sit with them first to help brainstorm possible solutions, but once they have used the size of the problem analogy a number of times, you should be able to help prompt them to work it out for themselves and help them to build resilience and problem solving abilities that will be useful as they progress through life.
